

Thirsty?

In one of his Lenten worship services, Pastor Mineo talked about the phrase "When it rains, it pours." Morton Salt built a marketing campaign around this saying, boasting about their table salt that would not clump in humid weather. Metaphorically, it also bemoans situations where one bad thing leads to another.

As we enter a new month, we may hear "April showers bring May flowers," something true in the United Kingdom, where the internet says this phrase came into use in the 1500s. There's more to the quote, but let's stick with this short form. Yes, in the Erie area, we'll see April rain, and enjoy May flowers. Metaphorically, this saying comforts us by saying that an unwelcome situation may have desirable outcomes.

We had a little water issue on a Friday in May 2021 with the drinking fountain in the Parish Center. It sent water to the floor, bringing sexton Joe to look at it. His investigation of this faulty unit led to the discovery of the much greater failure of pipes on the other side of the building that bring water service in from the city lines. That FLOOD of 2021 covered almost every corner of the basement under sanctuary, offices, and gym! If the drinking fountain was the "When it rains..." part, the failed pipes and resultant damage were the "...it pours" part!

Here's where we get to the gloomy April showers bringing the more desirable May flowers. Since the flood, we've made some upgrades to the Project Dignity gathering area and the rooms we use as headquarters. The parlor's original carpet has been replaced with new flooring. We've been forced to weed out some items no longer used by our ministries. There's still no renovation of the former Youth Room, so we still have work to do.

Back to the story of the drinking fountain issue that brought attention to the larger flood. In recent years, the water fountain has been shrouded in plastic, out of service. Time for another upgrade! Council has approved money from the Gym Activities and Equipment Fund to replace the old unit with a newer model that will have dual functions as water fountain and bottle filler. It's too early to predict the installation date, but we can look forward to a refreshing oasis as warmer weather approaches.

A drinking fountain is only one humble feature of a building where people gather for worship fellowship, and recreation. Water is an important element of hospitality, vital to life, and mentioned countless times in the Bible. Matthew 10:42 quotes Jesus "And whoever gives to one of these little ones even a cup of cold water because he is a disciple, truly, I say to you, he shall not lose his reward."

New Schedule for Project Dignity

St. John's has been sharing food and personal care items with neighbors in our surrounding community for over 40 years. Generations of St. John's members have served as leaders and staff, with fewer volunteers maintaining the service since the pandemic. In a plan that has approval from the Second Harvest Food Bank, Project Dignity staff will perform all behind-the-scenes tasks, and will open the doors to clients on the odd-numbered months, on our usual first and third Wednesdays. We will remain closed on even-numbered months to free staff to pursue events appropriate to their status as retirees. This new schedule will begin after May 2024. In the remainder of 2024, Project Dignity doors will open in July, September, and November, with a fun holiday event in December.

We hope that our Project Dignity neighbors will feel little impact, because many of the personal care items are distributed currently on alternate months. Glenwood Methodist Church, a neighboring Second Harvest Food Bank center, has offered to distribute food to our foodeligible neighbors along with their own clients on their designated Monday evenings during even-numbered months.

The ELC is one of five conferences in the NWPA Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). ELC has begun meeting regularly in person and in zoom settings to discuss shared interests. A few happenings of interest:

- Luther Memorial church will host a concert by Presque Isle Pro Musica at 4 pm on Sunday, April 7.
- Faith Lutheran Church will hold a Solar Eclipse party on April 8, with music, refreshments, crafts, prayer, and eclipse-safe glasses.
- Abiding Hope's noon-time Lunch and Listen speaker on Wednesday, April 10 is Dr. Beher Ghoshen, giving a talk about the world-wide phenomenon of immigration.
- St. Paul's Lutheran Church is the site of a ceremony of Pastor Erik Young as he is promoted to the rank of Captain in the Chaplain Corps of the US Navy Reserve. The event is Sunday, May 5, at 10:30 am, and is followed by a reception in their Parish Center.

Green Corner NWPA Synod Green Team

MONARCH BUTTERFLIES

With its iconic orange and black markings, the monarch butterfly is one of the most recognizable species in North America. They are remarkable because they migrate each year, flying from as far as Canada and across the U.S. to congregate and spend their winters in the mountains of central Mexico and coastal California. Over the past two decades, monarch numbers in North America have declined dramatically. As a result, research is being conducted to identify threats to the monarchs and take steps to conserve them throughout their range.

Due to droughts in areas such as Texas and illegal logging and subsistence farming in the Mexican Mountains, these areas are no longer providing the natural nectar sources desperately needed by the monarchs.

What can we do, in our area, to help the monarch population survive and flourish?

* Plant milkweed! It is the only plant that monarchs lay their eggs on and the only food the caterpillar will eat. Butterfly gardeners call this a host plant. As vacant lots and fields are lost, the amount of milkweed has decreased. Milkweed for Monarchs (nwf.org)

* Plant nectar plants! Adult monarchs feed on a wide variety of nectar bearing flowers and will visit many kinds in their search for food. When selecting flowers for your yard and gardens, consider planting flowers such as coneflowers, goldenrod, asters, butterfly weed. Your nursery can recommend butterfly-friendly plants. Fall blooming flowers are also important, as monarchs migrating to overwintering grounds require lots of nectar to build fat reserves to support their long-distance flight and sustain them throughout the winter.

* If you are able, plant milkweed and nectar bearing flowers in fields, vacant lots and highway strips.

*Reduce/eliminate use of pesticides in your garden.
