

"Moon Trees"

Amid my usual diet of fictional audio books, I listened recently to a non-fiction selection, <u>The Tree Collectors: Tales of Arboreal Obsession</u>, by Amy Stewart, published by Random House in 2024. As I listened to the many stories of people who visit, plant, and focus their lives on the love of trees, the phrase "Moon Trees" caught my attention.

In 1996, a third grade teacher and her students were just as "stumped" when they saw a tree with a plaque declaring it to be a "Moon Tree." The metal marker explained that the tree was grown from a seed that traveled into space in Apollo 14 in 1971. Teacher Joan Goble wrote to NASA for more information. NASA officials had to research this forgotten event to get the story. Astronaut Stuart Roosa, formerly a smoke-jumper working to save trees from fires, had been asked by a US Forest Service official to carry a small vial of 500 seeds of five different species into space. Roosa remained in the command ship as his colleagues walked on the moon, so the trees from these seeds actually should be called "Space Trees," but "Moon Trees" sounds so much better!

When the seeds returned to earth, they were sent to Forest Service stations to germinate them. Of the 500 seeds, 420 developed into seedlings. Most were given to state forestry groups to be planted for the US bicentennial celebration in 1976. Decades later, they look like their earth-bound counterparts, except for the plaques identifying them as celebrity trees.

Back to the "Tree Collectors" in the book—they like to visit the Moon Trees. *Wikipedia*'s online article about "Moon Trees" gives locations of about 100 space-age trees that we could visit!. The Tree Collectors also are fascinated by trees grown from seeds produced by the original Moon Trees. NASA sent a second batch of tree seeds aloft in Artemis I in 2022. How are the second generation Moon Trees faring? Who knows how many earthly trees carry this outer space heritage?

Scriptures speak the language of seeds and trees. Genesis 1:29 says that on the sixth day, God said, "Behold, I have given you every plant yielding seed which is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food." Seeds and trees for every physical function on earth, and seed-and-tree imagery used for our instruction and inspiration.

A seed from a heavenly source, sending roots deep into the soil, searching for water, emerging from the earth, branching as it grows, and launching generations of new growth through its fruit and seeds. It's a tree of life, and a story of faith that we have received from those who came before, spreading far and wide, and reaching toward the light from above.

Church Council Elections

At the annual Congregational Meeting, St. John's elected members to several positions: Church Council, (3 year terms): Janel Anderson, Bob Bestvina, Sandra Burton, Mark Eller, Molinda Kearns. They will join current Council members whose terms continue for one or two more years: Max Alwens, Janet Heubel, Roger Olsen, Marj Quinn, Paul Rapela, and Carolyn Sturtevant. At the February 2th Council meeting, the group will choose officers for President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer, and will identify committee liaisons.

We owe our sincere thanks to outgoing Council members, Barb Kulisek, who headed the Worship and Music Committee, and Tim Durst, who served as Treasurer, keeping our finances and budget in order as head of the Finance Committee. We hope that both Barb and Tim will continue their good work on these committees.

Treasurer Position Open

The role of Treasurer is vital to the financial health of St. John's. It can be filled by a member of Council, but Council membership is not a requirement. According to St. John's bylaws, the term of Treasurer is limited to a set number of consecutive years. For that reason, Tim Durst's term as Treasurer ended after 2024.

The Treasurer works in concert with the Office Administrator, the Finance Committee, and other Committees to record St. John's income and to cover expenses, all according to the budget. The Finance Committee meets the first or second Monday of each month. The Treasurer presents documents on the checking account, the investments, and the status of the budget at Council meetings on the 2nd Wednesday evening of each month. Online spreadsheet skills are a must.

Tim Durst stands ready to mentor and advise the next Treasurer, and he will answer questions for those who would like more information. Please share your financial talents with the congregation!

Our Neighbors' Place Keeping Many Warm



CREATION CARE ACTIVITIES FOR CHILDREN

One of the best creation-care actions that adults can perform is stimulating children to care for creation. The following activities can stimulate interest and be educational. Three are taken from **ELCA's 2024 "Our Kairos Moment – A Study Guide on Earth's Climate Crisis"**. The Study Guide is a tremendous learning resource for adults and children.

GREENHOUSE EFFECT EXPERIMENT: You will need a sunny day and warm location. Place two outdoor thermometers outside to come up to temperature. Then, place one thermometer inside a clear glass or plastic jar and cover it with a lid or plastic wrap. For one hour, measure the differences in temperature between the thermometers. The difference helps explain the greenhouse effect of gases trapping heat inside our atmosphere.

EARTH TOAST: Higher temperatures can have wide-ranging impacts on land, water, soil and human health. Visit https://tinyurl.com/2b87m62z to learn how to make "Earth Toast" with children. This activity from Left Brain, Craft Brain is a fun, creative way to start a conversation about the effects of heat.

THE EARTH AS AN APPLE: Imagine the earth as an apple. Cut the apple into quarters. One quarter is land and the rest is water. Cut the land quarter in half again to produce two one-eighth pieces of the apple. One of those eighth pieces is land covered with mountains, desert or ice. The other eighth is flat livable land. Cut the livable land into four pieces. Three of those are either wet, hot, rocky, infertile or covered with roads and buildings for cities. The other piece (one thirty-second) when peeled represents the topsoil of the earth that is suitable for growing the food that we eat. PAPER EGG CARTON GARDEN STARTER: This can be a great activity to do with children. Gather a paper egg carton, some soil and seeds from a local store. Fill the carton with soil and plant one seed in each cup. Place the tray on a water-resistant tray in a sunny location and water the seeds a bit each day. As your seeds start to sprout, talk together about all the resources that are needed for plants to grow: organic matter in soil, water and sunlight. After the seeds have grown and gotten two sets of leaves the egg carton can be separated into 12 sections and planted in your home garden, raised beds or pots. Try starting flower seeds or vegetable seeds. Enjoy! How does God's creation work together to create new life? Adapted from Our Kairos Moment "Planting in an Ice Cube Tray".
